A note from Eiko

Joan and I became friends relatively recently. We were strangers until we reached out to each other at the same time in 2018. Soon Joan invited me to her studio and I moved with projections of her video pieces. She then flew me to her summer home in Nova Scotia, where we worked alone for four days. During our Conversation Without Walls at Danspace last year, we both said that we were ready to do something we could not do when younger. We both agreed Joan would try directing me the next time we work together.

When Danspace commissioned a media work, I asked Joan if she would join me in two-week creative residency at St. Mark's Church Sanctuary. She said Yes!

Not directing myself or anyone else was liberating. She brought her wonderful team of helpers, many props and costumes, and took the lead in setting up, directing, shooting, and editing. This allowed me to be fully my performer-self. To my delight Joan joined me in many scenes. That was new for us. At each set up, we improvised, looked at the footage, and improvised again. I was totally happy with the process. We performed more

duets than we could put in this piece. In all, not only did I learn a lot about Joan, but also about myself. Thank you, Joan. I am grateful to her team (David, Jeri, Jan, Paula Sekeena), Judy, Ben, Yolanda, Lily, everyone at Danspace, and my team, Iris, Allison, and Paula.

Born and raised in Japan and a resident of New York since 1976. Eiko Otake is a movement-based, interdisciplinary artist. After working for more than 40 years as Eiko & Koma, in 2014 Eiko began performing her own solo project A Body in Places, which was also the title of her 2016 Danspace Project Platform. Since 2014, Eiko collaborated with photographer/historian William Johnston on creating A Body in Fukushima, which captures Eiko's body in places of nuclear contamination. Eiko has presented both photo exhibitions and film screenings of A Body in Fukushima in the US and internationally at museums and art centers.

In 2017, she launched a multi-year *Duet Project*, an open-ended series of cross-disciplinary, cross-cultural, and cross-generational experiments with a diverse range of artists. In addition to creating her works in her Virtual Studio during the pandemic, Eiko performed live for audiences at the Green-Wood Cemetery, Wesleyan University, and in Tokyo.

Eiko & Koma have been honored with a MacArthur Fellowship, the Samuel H. Scripps American Dance Festival Award, and the first Doris Duke Artist Award. For her solo work, Eiko has received a Bessie's Special Citation, an Art Matters

fellowship, the Anonymous Was a Woman Award, and the LMCC Sam Miller Award.

Joan Jonas was born in 1936 in New York, where she lives and works. Jonas is one of the most significant artists in the history of video and performance. Beginning in the 1960s, she placed female subjectivity at the center of her work, employing a complex linguistic repertoire including gestures. storytelling and images in movement. Jonas experiments with sources from fairy tales to essays, from myths to local folklore, both poetically and politically. In 2004, Jonas began collaborating with the composer Jason Moran on several projects and they continue to perform together.

In 2020/21 Jonas produced 75 drawings and a video for her participation in the 13th Shanghai Biennale, Bodies of Water. In 2020, she had her first solo show in South America, Joan Jonas: 5 Decades, at the Pinacoteca in Sao Paulo, Brazil. In 2019, in collaboration with TBA21, Jonas presented an immersive exhibition, Moving off the Land, at Chiesa di San Lorenzo, Venice, which then travelled to Museo Nacional Thyssen-Bornemisza, Madrid, Spain in 2020. In 2019 the Kyoto City University of Arts Art Gallery presented Five Rooms For Kyoto: 1972 -2019, Jonas' largest solo exhibition in Japan. In 2018 Jonas was the recipient of the Kyoto Prize in Arts and Philosophy. In 2018 Tate Modern devoted to her a major survey exhibition, which then travelled to Serralves Museum of Contemporary Art, Porto, Portugal. In

2015 Jonas represented the United States at the 56th Venice Biennale.

Iris McCloughan is an artist, writer, and performer. Their performance work has been presented in New York (Movement Research, The Poetry Project, The New Ohio, Ars Nova, JACK), Philadelphia (The Barnes Foundation, Philadelphia Contemporary, FringeArts, ICA Philadelphia), Chicago (Links Hall), and Detroit (Public Pool).

Iris was awarded the 2018 Stanley Kunitz Prize from American Poetry Review, and was named a finalist in nonfiction for Best of the Net 2020. They are the author of three chapbooks, including *Triptych* (2021, greying ghost) and *Bones to Peaches* (2021, Seven Kitchens Press). Their writing has appeared in jubilat, juked, Denver Quarterly, and Gertrude, among many others.

About Platform 2021

Platform 2021: *The Dream of the Audience* (May 15 – June 18, 2021), curated by Judy Hussie-Taylor, is a digital Platform featuring acclaimed artists and past Platform curators, each with longstanding relationships to Danspace Project: Ishmael Houston-Jones, Okwui Okpokwasili, Eiko Otake with Joan Jonas, and Reggie Wilson. Each of the artists are receiving residency time in St. Mark's Church and opportunities for live conversations. New short video works by the artists, created while in-residence at the church, will be screened during the Platform.

Each week of the Platform will feature: Monday Archives: Special Danspace archival footage released on the Online Journal, Issue 12.

Friday Film Screenings: A new film premiere, filmed on site at Danspace Project. Film premieres on Zoom.

In two Conversations Without Walls, Lydia Bell and Kristin Juarez will activate these archives. The Journal will also include new written works by Writer-inresidence, Maura Nguyen Donohue.

Platform 2021 takes inspiration from a poem by the late Korean American artist Theresa Hak Kyung Cha, in which Cha addresses the audience "as a distant relative." "Although written in 1977, Cha's text resonates with our current condition," says Hussie-Taylor. "This Platform is an homage to audiences."

Danspace Project presents new work in dance, supports a diverse range of choreographers in developing their work, encourages experimentation, and connects artists to audiences.

For over 45 years, Danspace Project has supported a vital community of contemporary dance artists in an environment unlike any other in the United States. Located in the historic St. Mark's Church in-the-Bowery, Danspace shares its facility with the Church, The Poetry Project, and New York Theatre Ballet. Danspace Project's Commissioning Initiative has commissioned over 570 new works since its inception in 1994.

Danspace Project's Choreographic Center Without Walls (CW²) provides context for audiences and increased support for artists. Our public programs (including Danspace Presents, Platforms, Food for Thought, DraftWork), Commissioning Initiative, residencies, guest artist curators, and contextualizing activities and materials are core components of CW² offering a responsive framework for artists' works. Since 2010, we have produced twelve Platforms, published thriteen print catalogues and five e-books, launched the Conversations Without Walls discussion series, and explored models for public discourse and residencies.
